



Uriah died in the battle just as David had planned.








Bathsheba mourned over her husband's death. David sent for her and they were married. Bathsheba gave birth to a son. But God was displeased with what David had done.

David and Bathsheba had another baby boy called Solomon.





David's son Absalom was very handsome. He wanted desperately to be the king of Israel. He started plotting against his father.
