


Paul was joined by Silas for his next big trip. Young Timothy came along with them too. They went from town to town encouraging churches and teaching the people.

She and her family were baptised. She persuaded Paul and his friends to come to stay at her house.



The judges were so embarrassed when they heard that Paul and Silas were Roman citizens. They rushed to take them from the jail and politely asked them to leave the city.


Before they left Philippi Paul and Silas made a visit to Lydia's house where they met with the believers once again.



So Paul stayed for a year and a half teaching the word of God.




Paul preached in many towns and cities. In some places he was well received and the church grew and prospered. In some places the people objected to his message and made trouble for Paul.

They went back upstairs again, shared bread together and carried on speaking until dawn. Paul then had to leave and Eutychus went home safe and well.





Paul returned to Jerusalem where he was warmly received by the church. But before long Paul was in trouble once again and put into prison once more.


At the harbour of Fair Havens on the island of Crete, Paul warned Julius, 'I can see this voyage ending in disaster. We should stay here.'
